PROCEEDINGS

of the

SIXTIETH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

In session assembled with the ENON Church, September 12, 13 and 14th, 1952 at the place where arrangements were made for the preaching. The service was introduced by Elder Emmette Case, followed by the introductory sermon delivered by Elder Grover Carey. Brother Carey used two scriptures as a text: "IN THAT DAY", and "TAKE IT BY THE TAIL".

Then the delegates assembled at the church house and after a short talk by Elder Jerry Hall, and prayer by Elder Charles Cornett, the association proceeded as follows:

- 1. Called for the letters from the several churches and received the letters and seated the delegates.
- 2. The association then organized by electing Elder Ester Hopkins as moderator; Elders B. H. Bevins and H. C. Maynard ,assistant moderators; Brother Troy T. Francis as Clerk, and F. M. Preece, assistant clerk.

- Ordered that the moderator make all temporary appointments.
- Clerks appointed to write letters to corresponding associations.

- 10. Committee appointed to take care of the visiting brethren as follows: Elders Lewis Smith, Willie Stanley, J. B. Anderson and Brothers Logan Spencer, Thomas Smith.
- 11. Committee appointed to see that the stand be supplied with ministers and that peace is preserved around the stand, consisting of Elders Lewis Smith, Willie Stanley and J. B. Anderson and Brothers Logan Spencer and Thomas Smith.
- 12. Committee appointed to arrange the ministry for Friday night, and Saturday, consisting of one member from each Church, with the entire delegation of the Enon Church, ministers as follows: Friday night Elders, first, G. M. Caudill; second, John Moore. Saturday Elders, first, S. T. Wright; second, Charles Cornett; third, Jerry Hall, and fourth, Taylor Blankenship.
- 13. Committee on arrangements, consisting of one member from each Church with the Moderators and Clerks ,with the corresponding associations invited.
- 14. On motion by Elder H. C. Maynard, the association adjourned until nine o'clock Saturday morning.

- 13. Ordered that we change the word, "ITS" to read "HIS" in Article 10, of our Articles of Faith.
- 14. Ordered that anyone desiring to have a picture put in our minutes may do so by paying the actual cost.
- 15. Ordered that we reprint in our minutes the resolution that was printed in our minutes in the year of 1911, pertaining to the ordination of ministers, which reads as follows: "Resolved that we advise the Church of this union before ordaining a minister to preach, to send such to the association where he may be examined by a committee of Elders appointed by the association, and if found orthodox the Church to which he belongs may ordain him."
- 16. Ordered that the Moderator appoint a committee, which he did, consisting of Elders Lewis Smith, Wayne Hearld, Asa Evans, Willie White, Emmette Case, B. H. Bevins and Jonah Bevins to examine Brother Watt Sheppard to see if he be sound in the Doctrine. Committee reported him to be sound.
- 17. Ordered that the Treasurer pay the expense of one car (1) for the visiting of sister associations, that is: paying for the gas and oil.
- 18. Ordered that we continue the printing of memorials in our minutes.
- 19. Ordered that we advise ministers of our association not to marry people into adultery where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.
- 20. Shall we receive into our fellowship men having more than one wife or women having more than one husband?

ANWSER—We advise the Churches not to receive into their fellowship any such, except those who have put away their companions for the cause of fornica-

tion, and such cases to have Gospel or Church evidence of same.

- 21. Ordered that our next Association be held with the Little Rosa Church, Chattaroy, Mingo County, W. Va., to begin on Friday before the second Saturday in September, 1953. Chattaroy, W. Va., is on Route 52, four miles west of Williamson, W. Va.
- 22. By vote it is ordered that Elder Tommy Adair, preach the introductory sermon, and that Elder Ester Hopkins, be his alternate.
- 23. Ordered that we tender our thanks to the Enon Church, and to the community at large for their hospitality shown us during this session of our Association.
- 24. Ordered that the minutes be read and signed by the moderators and clerks.
- On motion we adjourned to the time and place above mentioned.

It brings the good news that salvation is to be had; it offers this Salvation; it shows the way and how it is to be obtained; it works Grace to fit for and bring men to Salvation.

This Gospel, the Spirit of God, preached unto Abraham under the old testament, GALATIANS 3rd chapter and 8th verse,—"the scripture foreseeing that God would justify the heathen through Faith, preached before the Gospel unto Abraham, saying, "in thee shall all nations be blessed." The glad tidings of justification and salvation by faith in Christ were preached unto Abraham, and were contained in that promise made to him which is the sum of the coverant—In Thy seed shall all nations of the earth be blessed. GEN. 22nd and 18th.

The word GOSPEL in the original, signifies good news or glad tidings; and surely when a sinner who is exposed to the wrath of God, is sensible of his guilt and danger, it must needs be glad tidings to Him to hear of a way of Salvation and all sufficient Saviour.

GRACE

First Grace is taken for the free and eternal love of God, which is the source of all the benefits which we receive from Him. ROMANS 11th and 16th, and if by Grace, then it is no more of works. Second TIM-OTHY, 1st and 9th, Who hath saved us and called us with a Holy calling according to His own purpose and Grace. This free and unmerited love of God is the original move in our salvation and hath no cause above it to excite it or draw it forth, but merely arises from His own will. It was this mercy or love of God that

brought redemption for mankind. God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son to die for us. JOHN 3rd and 16th verse, And what could His love give more than the life of His son?

Second, Grace is taken for the free imputation of Christ's righteousness by the merit whereof true believers become righteous in the sight of God; ROMANS 5th and 20th, Where sin abounded, Grace did much more abound.

Third, for the work of the spirit renewing our soul after the image of God, and continually guiding and strengthening the believer to obey His will; to resist and mortify sin and overcome it. ROMANS 6th and 14th, Ye are not under the law, but under Grace. 2nd COR. 12th and 9th, My Grace is sufficient for thee.

Fourth, for that excellent and blessed state of reconciliation and friendship and favor with God, which God graciously bestows upon His people. ROMANS 5th and 2nd, By whom we have access by Faith into this Grace wherein we stand.

Fifth, for the free love, favor and bounty of Christ. 2nd COR. 8th and 9th, Ye know the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ which proceeds from the Grace of our God, and wherein His Grace is offered and bestowed upon all penitent believers. Ist Peter, 5th and 12th, This is the true Grace of God wherein you stand. True and only doctrine of the Bible.

Sixth, For a liberal and charitable disposition wrought in the heart by the Grace of God. 2nd COR. 8th and 7th, As ye abound in everything, see that ye abound in this Grace also.

Seventh, For spiritual instruction and edification, EPH. 4th and 29th, That your communication may minister Grace to the hearers, that it may be the means of some spiritual advantage to them.

Eighth, Grace is taken for the office of apostleship which was given of Grace, together with ability and qualifications necessary for the faithful discharge of that office. That is the apostle wishes to be continued with and increased in the ROMANS. ROM. 1st and 7th, To all that be in Rome, beloved of God, called to be Saints; Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Tenth, For the love and fear of God dwelling in the heart, or for the assistance of Divine Grace. 2nd COR. 1st and 12th, by the Grace of God, we had our conversation in the world.

Eleventh, For Faith, Patience and other Graces that enables us to bear and support under sufferings. 1st Peter 3rd and 18th, For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust that He might bring us to God. Being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the spirit; PHIL. 1st and 7th, Even as it is meat for me to think this of you all. Because I have you in my heart in as much as both in bonds and in the defense and confirmation of the Gospel ye are all partakers of my Grace.

Twelfth, For eternal life or final salvation which God will graciously bestow upon His people, at the appearing of Christ at the day of Judgment. 1st Peter, 1st and 3rd, The Grace that is to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ.

Thirteenth, For something beautiful and graceful. PROV. 4th and 9th, She shall give to thy head an ornament of Grace, a beautiful ornament.

Fourteenth, For favor or friendship with men. Joseph found Grace in the sight of Potiphar, GEN. 39th and 4th. John 1st and 14th, Begotten of the Father, full of Grace and truth. 16th verse, Of all His fullness we have all received Grace for Grace, the last word of joy and hope.

I must close. I could write on and on. I feel like the same spirit that has blessed me to preach the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ for thirty-five years, has aided me in writing this letter. There is a spirit in man; and the inspiration of the Almighty giveth them understanding. Therefore we should ever harken to His word. Isa. 30th and 21st, And thine ears shall hear a word behind thee saying, this is the way, walk in it. JOB 36th, 10, 11, 12 and 13th verses, He openeth also their ear to discipline and commandeth that they return from iniquity. If they obey and serve Him they shall spend their days in prosperity and their years in pleasures. But if they obey not, they shall perish by the sword, and they shall die without knowledge. Psalms 1, 4 and 5 verses.

Finally Brethren, farewell; be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind. Live in peace and the God of Love be with you.

CONSTITUTION

From a long series of experiences, we, the churches of Jesus Christ being regularly baptized upon our profession of faith in Jesus Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and preserve, maintain and keep the rules and orders of an association according to the following form of government:

Article 1. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches and duly sent to represent them in this association, who shall be members whom they shall think best qualified for the purpose. And, producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

Article II. In the letters from the different churches, shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, their baptized, received by letters, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since the last association.

Article III. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they infringe upon the internal rights of any church in the union.

Article IV. The association, when convened, shall be governed and ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

Article V. The association shall have a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, a Clerk and Assistant Clerk, also a Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Article VI. New churches may be admitted into our union that shall petition by letters and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and order-

ly, shall be received by the association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

Article VII. Every church in the union shall be en titled to a representative in the association.

Article VIII. Every query presented by any church to the association being first debated by their own church, shall be taken up by the association.

Article IX. Every motion made and seconded shall be taken up by the association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

Article X. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of the association.

Article XI. The churches shall send money by the delegates of each church for printing the minutes of the association.

Article XII. There shall be a record book kept wherein the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed for that purpose.

Article XIII. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the association rises.

Article XIV. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made at any time, by a majority of the union, when they deem necessary.

Article XV. All matters coming before the association shall be decided by the will of the majority.

Article XVI. The association shall have power:

- 1. To provide for the general union of churches
- To preserve inviolable a chain of communication among the churches.
- To give the churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

- To inquire into the cause when the churches fail at any time to present themselves in the association.
- To appoint any member by and with their consent to transact any business which they think necessary.
- 6. The association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union which shall violate the rules of the association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.
- To admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us in the association.
- 8. The association shall have power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches of the union. That no minister shall be ordained unless forwarded by the church, and it shall require two or more ordained ministers to compose a presbytery for that purpose.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

RULES OF DECORUM

Article I. The association to be opened and closed by prayer.

Article II. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Article III. Only one member shall speak at a time and he shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he is about to make a speech.

Article IV. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech, except by the Moderator, until he is done speaking, and shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before, nor make remarks on mishaps, failures or imperfections, but shall verily state the cause and matter as nearly as he can, so as to convey his light and idea.

Article V. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on one subject without consent of the association.

Article VI. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the association without liberty obtained therefrom.

Article VII. No member of the association shall have the liberty of laughing during the sittings nor whispering in the time of public speech.

Article VIII. No members of this association shall address another by any other term or appelation other than that of brother.

Article IX. The Moderator shall not interrupt a

Article IX. The Moderator shall not interrupt a member nor prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light upon the subject, except when he breaks the rules of decorum.

Article X. The names of the several members of the association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and call-

ed over as often as the Moderator requires.

Article XI. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as another member; provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the association be equally divided.

Article XII. Any member who shall wilfully and knowingly break any of the rules shall be reproved by the association as it may think proper.

Article XIII. The delegation to be seated in this association shall be limited to three members from each church.

Article XIV. No person shall speak more than five (5) minutes at the same time without liberty obtained from the association.
