PROCEEDINGS

of the

SIXTY FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

- In session assembled with the Bent Branch Church, September 7, 8, 9th, 1956. Service was introduced by Elder Emmette Case, followed by the introductory Sermon delivered by Elder Wayne Herald; "TEXT" Acts, fourth Chapter and Eleventh verse as follows: (this is the stone which was set at naught of you builders, which is become the head of the corner), then the delegates assembled at the Church House and after a short talk by Elder Jerry Hall, Sr., and prayer by Elder Tack Hall, the Association proceeded as follows:

- 8. Ordered that the Moderator make all Temporary appointments.
- Ordered, clerks to write letters to corresponding associations.
- 10. Committee appointed to take care of the visiting Brethren as follows: John Maynard, Edwin May and Ben Curry.
- 11. Committee appointed to see that the stand be supplied with ministers and that peace is preserved around the stand, same as above John Maynard, Edwin May and Ben Curry.
- 12. Committee appointed to arrange the ministry for Friday night and Saturday, consisting of one member from each Church, with the entire delegation of the Bent Branch Church. Ministers for Friday night as follows: Elders, first Johnie Hall; second, Johnie Church; and third, Taylor Blankenship.

Saturday, Elders, first, Wetzel Ball; second, Ray Collins; third, Reuben Dyer; and fourth, George Hagans.

- 13. Committee on arrangements, consisting of one delegate from each Church, with the Moderators and Clerks, with the corresponding Associations invited.
- 14. On motion by Elder B. H. Bevins, the Association adjourned until nine o'clock Saturday morning.

SATURDAY MORNING

Met pursuant to adjournment and after song, service was introduced by Elder, Caleb Creech.

- 1. Called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. Read the bill of arrangements and discharged the committee on same.
- 3. Appointed a committee on finance consisting of Elders Wayne Herald, Charlie Johnson and Emmette Case, who reported the contributions from each Church as shown in the statistical table.
- 4. Called on treasurer to report, who reported as follows:

- 5. By motion it is ordered that Troy T. Francis be appointed as Treasurer.
- 6. Ordered that the Clerk superintend the printing of the minutes, and that he have 3000 copies printed, and that he be allowed \$50.00 for his services as Clerk, Secretary and Treasurer.
- 7. Brethren called in union meetings and associations last year made this reports. Their reports received, failures excused. They all were admonished to be more faithful this coming year.

- 8. By motion it is ordered that we continue printing union meetings in our minutes.
- 9. Appointed the same committee to arrange for preaching Saturday night and Sunday, who reported as follows: Saturday night, first Elders, Ernest Breedlove; second, Elias Cotton.

Sunday, Elders, first, W. T. Wright; second, Elmer Church; third, Fon Bowling; fourth, Tack Hall; and fifth, our Monerator Elder Ester Hopkins closed the service.

A CIRCULAR LETTER

To the moderator and officers of the Sardis Association and to the brethren and sisters in the Lord everywhere: Where it has pleased our Lord to place His name.

I believe this to be the first time I have been chosen to address you through the channels of our beloved Association and I pray God that His Spirit will so overshadow and lead me that I will be able to write to the Edification of His Sanctuary or Kingdom on earth and to your happiness and enjoyment.

If I should not quote too many scriptures is because I want you to keep more closely in touch with what I am trying to say instead of so often referring to verses etc.

Come hither and I will shew thee the bride thelamb's wife.

The true church is represented as woman, Isaiah 54. Mystery babylon is compared to a woman, Rev. 17-5.

I believe it is freely admitted by all, that God has a Church or Kingdom on earth. The great trouble is brethren that because the worldly Churches set in this world by Man agree with us on The Divinity of Christ, The Truth of The Scriptures, The Resurrection and Many other points, it has induced man down through the ages to lay hold on them Instead of Concerning himself with Eternal Life by a new Birth in Christ Jesus the Lord and being led by His Spirit.

- (1) The law and the prophets were until John: Since that time the Kingdom of God is preached and every man presseth into it.
- (2) For the Kingdom of God is not meat and drink: But righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.
- (3) And from the days of John the Baptist until now, the Kingdom of God suffereth violence and the violent take it by force.
 - (4) Upon this rock I will build my Church etc.
 - (5) And I appoint unto you a Kingdom etc.

All the scripture listed above prove beyond any question of doubt that His Kingdom is a visible one—composed of men and women who have become dead to sin and have been made Alive in Him by the operation of His Spirit and are Convented to-gether to keep His Commandments in His Kingdom. I firmly believe also brethren that it is invisible and that the invisible part is the brethren and sisters that have outstripped us in this life and have gone on to be with the Lord and are on yonders shore waiting and watching our approach to that city.

When the God of Heaven would establish His Church or Kingdom (and brethren I can't divide them) on earth. He took a seed or plant from the Eternal Kingdom in Heaven and planted it on earth in the Holy Hill Zion and Isaiah (60-14) shows her to be The City of The Lord, The Zion of The Holy One of Israel.

- 4—The new birth is from heaven.
- 5—It is all in Him, through Him and by Him.
- 6—He is the head of the body—He is the wisdom of the body and He is the life of the body.
 - 7—The Church is His body.

Brethren let's not confuse this one with man made institutions that are not eternal and will therefore perish when man perishses that formed them—but having received a kingdom that can not be moved—and Daniel says—shall not be left to other people—and Isaiah says—the redeemed of the Lord shall walk

there and shall consume all these kingdoms and stand forever—lets be the more earnest in thanks and praises unto His name.

I preach and teach everywhere, as Paul says, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one sheep fold and one shepherd of the sheep, one kingdom both visible and invisible and will persevere through grace to glory.

Will you allow me now to trace that little family of God through this world that I was born into and became a part of ,if you please in as humble a way as I have ever been taught how.

Let it suffice to say that the man God had formed and placed in that Garden violated His law was turned out. Cherabims and a flaming sword was placed to guard the way of the tree of Life. Man had sold himself for Naught and did not have the substance required to purchase himself back in favor with God.

As the world was peopled God saw the wickedness of man was great and it, repented Him that He had made man. One man found favor in His sight Noah and he was instructed to make an Ark. He made it of Gopher Wood and brethren God knew there was enough of this kind to make it. Not one stick of any other kind was found in it. There is just one kind in the True Church to-day brethren—those who became Dead to sin and are born again. No man adds himself brethren—He is born into her, if so be he is in. When Noah would inquire of land—he sent out the Raven. It never came back—it was satisfied to feed and feast on the Dead Carcasses. The little dove did return.

Again the world was peopled and we hear God calling Abram out of his country, into a land that God would give unto him. His name did not remain Abram for long brethren but after his faith was proven God changed his name to Abraham. Yours has been changed too if so you have been born again.

We now see his offspring being sold into Egypt and how that Hebrew nation thrived under the leadership of Joseph who had been brought into favor of the king—by God's own working. After 430 years we see them taking their departure from Egypt under the guiding hand of Moses. God had given Moses training handling natural sheep before sending him to lead His sheep out of that land. Egypt finally Thrust them out however and we see the kind of hands of Moses

administering unto them. Oh brethren how that man of God so wonderfully led them about. Willing on at least one occasion to be driven from God's face for their sakes. We see them at the Red Sea with that great body of water on one side and Pharoah's forces on the other side of them. Moses was not freightened —Stand Still says he and see the Salvation of the Lord. We see them marching towards that land that God had swore He would give unto Abraham. When the priest that was carrying the Ark of the Covenant touched the waters of Jordan, the waters rolled back and they walked across on dry land.

Moses had vouched unto the people that a prophet shall the Lord your God raise up of your brethren like unto me—him shall ye hear in all things, and it shall come to pass that every soul that wont hear that prophet shall be cut off from among the people.

We now see Jesus, born in Bethleham of Judea. Time and space won't permit any detail here but we feel all are well informed about this birth and His growing into manhood and being subject unto His parents. I suppose many in that land knew of His family and family ties but yet He had not as yet been manifested to the Household of Faith. On this occasion He walked from Gallilee to Jordan to be baptised of John in Jordan; to enter upon His Priesthood. We hear so much about Baptism of late that I probably should not mention it here; however Jesus was then laying Salvation's plan. He was given as Leader and a Commander to the people. A wonderful counsellor brethren. His council is still wonderful and lets take all of it brethren. The scriptures no where cross themselves but each scripture gives strength to one connecting with it. The scriptures say "He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved". No where does the scripture take weight from this one. Water brethren can not take away sin. It takes the blood of the everlasting covenant to do this. Water is not sufficient; however a pool of water no bigger than it takes to bury an individual in can not be taken from it's rightful place in God's plan of salvation. Jesus placed it as a door into this visible Church or Kingdom here in the earth. In this we are buried with him in Baptism. If we had not met Him before Baptism, then we could not be buried with Him in Baptism. This is the only way in which we can answer that Good Conscience and Raise to Walk In Newness of Life. We can then be like the Eunuch, go on our way rejoicing.

Jesus did live that perfect and innocent life on earth and produced in His Veins that Innocent Blood the seal of the Everlasting Covenant by the which men and women can be washed from sin. This is the only substance brethren that can accomplish this.

Jesus then met the old Church under the Law at Jordan, she having leaned upon His Arm through the wilderness. I believe He was baptised into the old Church under the law for—God said He would send the Rod of His Strength out of Zion. No wonder then Solomon called Her his sister his spouse and Spring shut up a Fountain Sealed.

Jesus led the Church by sight for a period of about three and one half year-imparting to them that he had chosen to be with him—His Laws Precepts and Examples that they might administer them after He had departed from this time world. Jesus honored that Law with His Life on that night of nights brethren when He took the Pascal supper with the twelve, and after Judas left, turned and set up That New and Living Way. He took the bread and wine and washed His disciples feet and told me and you to follow in His footsteps. If He is our Lord and Master we will perform this as all other things He set in order in His Church. You and I have been Invited to-Occupy-till He comes. We are not permitted to change one thing that He set in order. Brethren lets be careful not to remove any of the old Landmarks our fathers have set. My God-My God-Brethren lets not be guilty of trying to Remove any of them. They ought to be our meat and our drink.

Jesus set the Church to work under the Grace Covenant brethren on top of the mountain as both Isaiah and Micah said He would do. They both said Nations or People would flow into it. John then was with Christ in the mount. I want to take you back to the top of this mountain in just a minute brethren after this brief announcement.

First I want to say that the Churches set up in Asia and we read in the Revelation of the letters sent to the Seven. Others grew out of these Seven brethren until many were in that country. That is the only way a Church can be set in motion is to come out of another Church and be set in order by Presbytery appointed by the mother Church to do this one work and no Elder can set in motion or moderate a body until it is set in order as outlined above.

By this practice and the Doctrine they held, are we able to trace Her back to the days of Christ and The Apostles.

The Churches prospered of the Lord until about the year 251 when the woman seated on the Scarlet Colored Beast came into power through the brain of Cyprain of Cartage. The scriptures say that there was War in Heaven. Allow me to say here that I firmly believe that the Garden of Eden in it's perfect state was the first Heaven—The Church that Christ set in order is the Second Heaven (foresake not the assembling of your selves to-gether in Heavenly Places) and where God is or dwells is the Third Heaven. This war then was in the Church or Heavenly Place. The corrupt element or False Church was cast out and the True Church marched on. The casting out of the corrupt element in the year 325 was called the Novation rupture. This occurred before the flight of the woman into the Wilderness where God's people lived in caves of the mountains of the Piedmont region and in the Alps mountains-Solomon saw Her in the Clifts of the Rocks—As a Roe on the Mountain—As the Lilly Among Thorns—As the Bright and Morning Star and was finally made to exclaim "That the Winter is Past, the Rain is Over and Gone, the Flowers Appear on the Earth, and the Time of the Singing of the Birds is Come and the Voice of the Turtle is Heard in Our Land." Revelation 12-14 "And theWoman Given the Wings of a Great Eagle, that She might Fly Into the Wilderness, Unto Her Place, Where She is Nourished For a Time, Times and Half a Time From the Face of the Serpent. Daniel 12 chapter shows this to be a time, Times and the Dividing of Time which is same as spoken in Revelation. Now if a time is a year, times, two years and the divding of time or half a time is a half year, then we have 3-1/2 phrophet

years or 1260 days. In phrophecy a day stands for a year thus we have 1260 years; the time the true Church was in the Wilderness, where she was Nourished of God. Here the world lost sight of her. But not her little children. When we see a train enter a tunnel and comes out on the other end with the same infallible conductor, the same crew, the same baggage, we of a surety know it is the same train that entered. So it is with the True Church in the wilderness period of Her travels. We still have a record however, and your unworthy servant is in possession of letter written during this trying, but we think, the purest time when the Alter Fires Of Our Great Redeemer was kept burning in this wilderness, of their Letters of Association, and one stated that their tears were no longer tears of water but of blood. Oh how our dear brethren suffered during that 1260 years. Just read one of the books of Martyrs for your servant would never be able in all his lifetime to even try to tell you of their suffering. Add to this 1260 years, the year 425 when The Romish Harlot began her punishment of God's people and you will have a very important date in America-1685—when Thomas Griffith with an entire Church of 16 souls came to Rhode Island from Wales England and settled in this country. History says they took the Lords supper aboard ship thinking it might be their last. After the treaty of Westphalia was signed and the Romish Harlot lost her power to force Gods little children to join her ranks, they began to come to this country. Your school history says that Roger Williams set up the first Baptist Church in this Country. He did not do so. Williams baptised Ezekiel Holliman and then He baptised Williams, both of which was illegal, and Williams went back to England to get a legal baptism and never returned.

We now see the Churches thus set up in this country prospering of the Lord and I believe God visited the hearts of the Indians for Gods little children got along with them very well.

From this beginning in America, we trace our beloved Association back through some bearing indian names. I am attaching to this letter and making it a part of the same a historical account from the days of Christ and the Apostles down to this present day of the Baptist Succession of Churches.

Now brethren earlier in this letter I said I wanted to take you back to the top of that mountain that both Isaiah and Micah spoke about and the Psalmist in 72 Psalm said "There shall be an handful of corn in the earth upon the top of the mountains: The fruit thereof shall shake like Lebanon: And they of the city shall flourish like grass of the earth." It was then Exalted above the hills. Is it Exalted to-day the minds and hearts of His believing children. It should be Uppermost. It is the Only Eternal Body in this World.

Now John was with Christ in the mount. We now see this loving apostle on an isle called Patmos. He was cast there for the Word's Sake and while on that rocky isle it seems to me passed the most beneficial years of His life. Among many things John told us of while on the isle there is one scene I want to call to your memory and want each and every one that hears or reads this letter of your humble servant, stop and give the More Earnest Thanks for this disclosure of that loving little apostle called John. He saw the City New Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God, adorned as A Bride For Her Husband. She had gates and the like and a wall great and high and it had Foundations 12. On each was written the names of the 12 apostles of the Lamb. Don't you see brethren that John here saw his own name there which is positive proof that the 12 Jesus ordained and sent out on the Mount was and is the Foundation stones under Grace—Jesus Himself Being The Chief Corner Stone Other Foundation Can No Man Lay.

Brethren I must close, but please forgive me for being so lengthy but this subject could be written about for all the years of our life and then the half would not have been told.

My God bless and save you all, is the prayer of your humble brother in the Lord.

- 7. Adromicus from the Pontifossi Church organized the Darethea Church in Asia monor A.D. 671. See Lambert's History page 47.
- 8. Arthur Flavin from the Dorethea Church organized the "Timto" Church A.D. 738. See Mosheims history Vol. 1 page 394.
- 9. Balcola from the Timto Church in Asia Minor, organized the Lima Piedmont Church A.D. 812. See Neander's Church history Vol. 2 page 320.
- 10. AAron Arlington was ordained 940 A.D. by the Lima Piedmont Church. See Jones Church history page 324.
- 11. AAron Arlington from the Lima Piedmont Church organized the Hillcliffe Church A.D. 987. See Munston's history Israel of the Alps page 39.

CONSTITUTION

From a long series of experiences, we, the churches of Jesus Christ being regularly baptized upon our profession of faith in Jesus Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and preserve, maintain and keep the rules and orders of an association according to the following form of gov-

Article 1. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches and duly sent to represent them in this association, who shall be members whom they shall think best qualified for the purpose. And, producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall

Article II. In the letters from the different churches, shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, their baptized, received by letters, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since the last association.

Article III. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they infringe upon the internal rights of any

Article IV. The association, when convened, shall be governed and ruled by a regular and proper de-

Article V. The association shall have a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, a Clerk and Assistant Clerk, also a Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage

Article VI. New churches may be admitted into our union that shall petition by letters and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

Article VII. Every church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the association.

Article VIII. Every query presented by any church to the association being first debated by their own church, shall be taken up by the association.

Article IX. Every motion made and seconded shall be taken up by the association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

Article X. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of the association.

Article XI. The churches shall send money by the delegates of each church for printing the minutes of the association.

Article XII. There shall be a record book kept wherein the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed for that purpose.

Article XIII. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the association rises.

Article XIV. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made at any time, by a majority of the union, when they deem necessary.

Article XV. All matters coming before the association shall be decided by the will of the majority.

Article XVI. The association shall have power:

- 1. To provide for the general union of churches.
- 2. To preserve inviolable a chain of communication among the churches.
- To give the churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty.
- To inquire into the cause when the churches fail at any time to present themselves in the association.
- To appoint any member by and with their consent to transact any business which they think necessary.
- The association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union which shall violate the rules of the association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.
- 7. To admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us in the association.
- 8. The association shall have power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches of the union. That no minister shall be ordained unless forwarded by the church, and it shall require two or more ordained ministers to compose a presbytery for that purpose.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heaven by instinction, that it has God for its Author; error for its end, and truth without any mixture of which God will judge us and, therefore, is and shall christian union and the supreme standard by which all human conduct and opinions shall be tried.

Article II. That there is one and only one true and living God, whose name is Jehovah, the maker and the supreme ruler of Heaven and earth, inexpressible, glorious in holiness, worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love, revealed under the personal relation of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct, but harmonious, offices in the great work of redemption.

Article III. That man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression, fell from that holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, terly devoid of that holiness, required by the law of God, wholly given to the gratification of the world, to are under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

Article IV. That the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, the meditorial offer of the son of God, who took upon Him our nature yet, without sin honored the law by His personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death, being risen from the dead, person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfection, is in every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all sufficient Saviour.

Article V. That the great gospel blessing which Christ in his fullness bestowed in such as believe in him, is justified and that justification consists in the pardon of his sins and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, that it is bestowed, not in condition of any works of righteousness we have done, but through his own righteousness.

Article VI. That the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel, and that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial and obedient faith.

Article VII. That in order to be saved, we must be regenerated or born again, that regeneration consists in giving holy disposition to the mind and is effected in a manner above our comprehension or calculation by the power of the Holy Spirit so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel, and its proper evidence is found in the holy fruit which we bring forth to the Glory of God.

Article VIII. That such only are real believers as endure to the end, that their persevering attachment to Christ is the ground work which distinguish them from superficial professors, that a special providence watches over their welfare and they are kept by the power of God, through faith unto salvation.

Article IX. That a visible Church of Christ is a congregation of Baptized believers associated by a covenant of faith in the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ's government by His law and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges in them by his work, that its only proper officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose qualification claims and duties are described in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus.

Article X. That Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, to a solemn and beautiful emblem of our faith in a crucified and risen Saviour, with His purefying power that is presented to the privilege of a Church unto the Lord's Supper in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by a solemn and self examination.

Article XI. We believe that feet washing is an example of Jesus Christ, and ought to be observed and kept up by His Church until His second coming.

Article XII. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust. Also that the happiness of the saints, and the punishment of the wicked are eternal.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article I. The association to be opened and closed by prayer.

Article II. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Article III. Only one member shall speak at a time and he shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he is about to make a speech.

Article IV. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech, except by the Moderator, until he is done speaking, and shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before, nor make remarks on mishaps, failures or imperfections, but shall verily state the cause and matter as nearly as he can, so as to convey his light and idea.

Article V. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on one subject without consent of the association.

Article VI. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the association without liberty obtained therefrom.

Article VII. No member of the association shall have the liberty of laughing during the sittings nor whispering in the time of public speech.

Article VIII. No members of this association shall address another by any other term or appelation other than that of brother.

Article IX. The Moderator shall not interrupt a member nor prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light upon the subject, except when he breaks the rules of decorum.

Article X. The names of the several members of the association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as the Moderator requires.

Article XI. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as another member; provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the association be equally divided.

Article XII. Any member who shall wilfully and knowingly break any of the rules shall be reproved by the association as it may think proper.

Article XIII. The delegation to be seated in this association shall be limited to three members from each church.

Article XIV. No person shall speak more than five (5) minutes at the same time without liberty obtained from the association.
