# SEVENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE

#### SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

#### FRIDAY SEPTEMBER 12, 1969

The Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist, The Church of Jesus Christ, assembled with the Mt. Pleasant Church, Sidney, Pike County, Kentucky on Friday before the second Saturday in September 1969. The many Brethren, Sisters and Friends assembled in the Church House because of the chilly weather and soon were joyfully singing those old songs of Zion. I could not help rejoicing as I looked upon this beautiful congregation and watched the children of God shake hands with smiling faces and loving hearts in that good old fashioned way! God smiled down upon this old Association from the hour she convened and the chilly, foggy morning gave way to the warm sunshine from His heaven.

Elder Charlie Johnson opened the services about the hour of 9:30 a.m and preached of love from the depths of his heart.

Elder Steve Robinson, Jr. led in prayer.

Elder Wayne Herald preached the Introductory Sermon using Daniel 2:44 for his Text: "And in the days of these Kings shall the God of Heaven set up a Kingdom, which shall never be destroyed: and the Kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these Kingdoms, and it shall stand for ever." Brother Wayne was blessed beyond measure to preach of this Kingdom and, with the Bible for a foundation and History for evidence, he traced this Kingdom from Daniel down to the present day.

The Delegates from the several Churches of the Sardis Association along with the Delegates from the Sister Associations remained in the Church House where arrangements had been made for the work of the Sardis Association, while the many Brethren, Sisters and Friends were dismissed to assemble at the Stand where arrangements had been made for preaching.

Elder Banner Mann, New Salem Association, addressed the Brother Delegates and spoke with deep understanding of the need for Churches and Associations to come closer together and work in love and in order. Brother Mann then led in prayer.

Our beloved Moderator, Elder Edwin May, was unable to attend the Association because of a heart attack but I know Brother Ed was with us in prayer and in spirit. Therefore, our loving and very capable Assistant Moderator, Elder Wayne Herald, stood as Moderator of the Sardis Association and we proceeded as follows:

- (1) The Moderator, Elder Wayne Herald, called for the Letters from the several Sardis Association Churches to be handed in to the Clerk. The Letter from the Mt. Pleasant Church was read by the Clerk and, upon motion by Elder Charlie Johnson and second by Elder Willie Stanley, all Letters were received, the Delegates seated, and Queries and Request were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- (2) The Association completed its organization by electing the following Officers:

(13) A Committee on Arrangements was appointed consisting of one Delegate from each Church of the Sardis Association, Moderator, Clerk and the entire Delegation from our Corresponding Associations to arrange the business for Saturday's session.

(14) On motion by Brother Clifford Maynard and second by Brother James Scott the Sardis Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

#### SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 13, 1969

Met pursuant to adjournment and after singing many of the old time songs of Zion, Elder Kirby Ison of the Indian Bottom Association opened the meeting with preaching. Elder Elmer Church, Union Association, led in prayer. Business then proceeded as follows:

- (1) Called the roll of Delegates and marked the absentees.
- (2) Read the Bill of Arrangements and on regular move and second, received the report and discharged the Committee on Arrangements.
- (3) Appointed a Committee on Finance as follows:

This Committee reported \$740.00 received from the several Churches and, after turning this amount over to the Treasurer, was discharged.

(A discussion on expected costs and the amount of money on hand led to a contribution of money from the House and one from the Stand, the results are included in the Treasurer's report.)

(4) Called for the Treasurer to report and, on regular move and second, received the following report:

- (6) By motion and second it was ordered that the Clerk superintend the printing of our Minutes, that he have 4,000 copies printed, and that he be allowed \$100.00 for his services. The Clerk is to reserve 100 copies of our Minutes for New Salem Association, Union Association and Northern New Salem Association and not less than 50 Minutes for all other corresponding Associations.

- (11) A Request from Sidney Church and a similar Request from Buck Creek Church, to do away with our present Constitution, Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith and to adopt those in our 1935 Minutes, were considered together. The Association by regular move and second decided to keep the ones we now have.
- (12) A motion by Elder Ellis Davis to reprint Item No. (11) of our 1968 Minutes met with a second by Elder John Lowe and an objection by Elder J. G. Thornberry. Voting of the Delegates showed 32 in favor of the motion and 36 against it. Item No. (11) of our 1968 Minutes is still an Order of the Sardis Association in full force and effect but is just not reprinted.
- (13) By regular move and second it was ordered not to reprint Items No. (12), (13), (14), (15), (16), (17), (18), (24) and (25) of our 1968 Minutes. These Items are not done away with but are just not reprinted.
- (14) A request from Tibitha Church to drop Charles S. Frye from our list of Ordained Ministers, because he withdrew from that Church after being told that Tibitha Church could not keep him on Recommendation but only through an experience and baptism, was granted by regular move and second. Therefore, Charles S. Frye is not preaching under the patronage of the Tibitha Church nor of the Sardis Association.
- (15) The Association by regular move and second said, that if a Sister has cut her hair she should be asked to let it grow out; if she fails to do so and cuts her hair again she will be excluded.
- (16) By motion and second, it is ordered that we advise our Ministers of our Association not to marry people into adultry, where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.
- (17) A motion and second to reprint Item No. (21) of our 1968 Minutes met with an objection by Elder Willis Dials. Voting of the Delegates showed 60 in favor of reprinting the Item and 2 against it. The Item reads as follows:

"Shall we receive into our fellowship men or women having more than one wife or husband? ANSWER: We advise the Churches not to receive into their fellowship any such, except those who have put away their companion for the cause of fornication; such cases to have Gospel or Church evidence of same."

- (18) By motion and second it is ordered that request for Union and Memorial Meetings be published in our Minutes.
- (19) By motion and second it is ordered that Obituaries of our deceased Brothers and Sisters that are in good standing with the Church at the time of death be printed in our Minutes. These are to be presented to the Clerk at the end of the Association.
- (20) By motion and second it was ordered that the picture of an Elder's wife presented with her Obituary be printed without charge.
- (21) In answer to a Request from Pilgrim's Home Church to grant a request of Elder Jonah E. Williamson to print the Obituary of his daughter, Fayetta Williamson Muncy, in our Minutes, the Association by regular move and second granted their Request.
- (22) Brethren called in Union Meetings and in Associations last year made their reports which were received and their failures excused. Our Brethren did a good job of filling their appointments.
- (23) A Request for the 1970 Sardis Association was received from Southern Home Church and from Leannah Church. By motion and second it is ordered that our next Association meeting be held with the Leannah Church beginning on Friday before the second Saturday in September 1970. Leannah Church is located in Martin County, Kentucky, near Pilgrim, Kentucky, on the Meat House Fork of Wolf Creek, and about 16 miles from Lovely, Kentucky on Route 1714. Beginning at Lovely, Kentucky we will have signs up to show the way.

Directions from Pikeville, Kentucky are: Route 119 to Sidney, Kentucky (where our 1969 Association was held) then Route 468 to junction of Route 292 (on the Kentucky side of the Nolan, West Virginia toll bridge) then left hand turn onto Route 292 to Lovely, Kentucky and then Route 1714. (You can also go on to Williamson, West Virginia from Pikeville, Kentucky and see below for directions from Williamson, West Virginia.)

Directions from Williamson, West Virginia are: Route 52 to Kermit, West Virginia, cross the toll bridge into Kentucky and turn left onto Route 292 to Lovely, Kentucky and then Route 1714. (You can also cross Tug River at Williamson, West Virginia into South Williamson, Kentucky, then to Appalachian Regional Hospital, then Route 292 to Lovely, Kentucky and then Route 1714.)

Directions from Paintsville, Kentucky are: Route 40 to Inez, Kentucky and to the Kentucky side of the Kermit, West Virginia toll bridge, then Route 292 to Lovely, Kentucky and then Route 1714.

- (24) A regular move and second that Elder Jeff May preach the Introductory Sermon at our next Association and that Elder Willie Stiltner be his alternate met with an objection by Brother Willie Stanley. Voting of the Delegates showed 43 in favor of the motion and 8 against it. (This objection was not made to keep our beloved Elders Jeff May and Willie Stiltner from filling these posts. It was made because some of the Brethren wanted to take a secret vote on who should fill these jobs. Your Clerk felt this explanation must be added for the benefit of those reading these Minutes who were not present.)
- (25) By motion and second it is ordered that the Association request all of our Churches, who can and want to, to send a donation to the Church who will host our next Association, Leannah Church.
- (26) By motion and second it is ordered that we, the Sardis Association, tender our humble "thank you" to each and every member of the Mt. Pleasant Church; the Pike County Board of Education; Frank T. Welch, Principal, and faculty members of the Bevins School; Pike County Sheriff Department, Brother Jim Bevins and Keither Blackburn; Call Funeral Home, Justice Funeral Home and Rogers Funeral Home who provided chairs and tents; Westcott Lumber Company; and the great host of others too numerous to list here who prayed so faithfully and worked so hard to make this Association one of the sweetest ever held. Last but not least, we want to express a special "thank you" to the Sisters and Friends who worked so hard in the lunch room and at home to prepare, bring and serve an abundance of delicious foods.
- (27) By motion and second the reading of the Minutes was omitted
- (28) On motion by Brother Clifford Maynard and second by Brother Floyd Williamson, it is ordered that the Sardis Association adjourn to the time and place mentioned above.

Elder Wayne Herald, who did an excellent job of Moderating the Association, expressed his belief that God had received and sealed the work of this Association and he humbly gave God the praise for blessing us with such a good Association. The Sardis Association then adjourned by way of prayer.

### SEPTEMBER 14, 1969

God continued to bless this old Association on this Sabbath morn and His heaven gave forth warm and sunny skies. Hundreds of Brethren, Sisters, and Friends assembled early and were soon singing the songs of Zion and shaking hands with thankful hearts.

Elder Roy B. Akers, Northern New Salem Association, introduced the services preaching of the love and precious blood of Jesus. Elder Hershell Huff New Salem Association led in prayer

Elder Paris Tackett, Northern New Salem Association, came to the Stand and was greatly blessed to continue preaching of the love of God and the precious blood of Jesus.

Elder Mitchell Chaffins, New Salem Association, came to the Stand and was surely blessed to preach Jesus from his Text, Isaiah 22:23, "And I will fasten him as a nail in a sure place; and he shall be for a glorious throne to his father's house."

Elder Wayne Herald, our loving and capable Assistant Moderator, came to the Stand weeping for joy and stated he felt more like crying than preaching. He took for a Text, Psalms 133:1, "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" Brother Wayne's cup was filled to overflowing and the spirit that filled his heart was made manifest in his preaching and in his countenance.

### CIRCULAR LETTER

Dear Brethren and Sisters of the Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist.

In answer to your request at our last Association, I will try, by the help of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, to fulfill that request and write a Circular Letter for your inspection when you are assembled together with the Mt. Pleasant Church, Friday before the second Saturday in September 1969. I am trusting that I will humble myself in a way that would be pleasing to our God of all Glory and that He would enable me to write a letter that would be pleasing to Him, one that would meet with your approval, one that would be upbuilding to His Church, and one that may be of some value to a poor sinner if he should ever read it or hear it read.

My subject will be found in the following two verses of Scripture. (Romans 5:12), "Wherefore as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned." (I Corinthians 15:22), "For as in Adam all die, even so in *Christ* shall all be made *alive*."

What then is the world? The ground we stand upon? No, that is the Earth, God's footstool. The Sea upon which man sails? No. The atmosphere, space or even outer space where man is now attempting to explore and conquer? Again, I say no. The world is the state or condition that I came into when I was a very young boy. When I knew to do good and didn't do it, I entered into the world. The world is the habitat of men and women living in their sins, and being aliens from God.

(Romans 7:9), "For I was alive without the law once but when the Commandment came, sin revived, and I died." Sin is not imputed where there is no law. From the moment of my birth upon the face of this earth until my entrance into the world, I was as good as God wanted me to be. I was under the Ark of Safety. If natural death had overtaken me during this period of time Heaven would have been my Eternal Home, because I would have been saved by grace and grace alone.

When I entered into the world, my soul was dead in trespasses and sins, not the sin that Adam committed, but the sins that I committed. I lived in the world and served sin for several years of my life, because it was my choice, my own free choice.

(Mark 16:16), "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." This is the baptism of the Holy Ghost. The baptism we must receive before we go down to the creek or river to be baptized at the hands of our beloved Elder Brethren.

What does it mean to repent, or what is repentance? Repentance is the turning away from sin, from your own steadfastness and self-righteousness, to have a deep feeling of sorrow or regret for the things you have done in the past that were not pleasing in the sight of God. Repentance is a godly sorrow set up in the heart that worketh repentance unto salvation that needeth not to be repented of. From the depths of man's heart he must be sorry for all the trespasses and sins that he has committed against God, pray and beg God for his tender *mercy*. When man has suffered enough to satisfy God, God will take over and do for man that which man cannot do for himself. (St. John 3:5), "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the Kingdom of God." It is the soul or spirit that is regenerated or born again, not of a corruptible seed, but by an incorruptible seed, by the word of God, that liveth and abideth forever.

When the soul is regenerated or born again man's name is recorded in the Lamb's Book of Life. He is a fit subject at this time (and not before) to present himself to the Church and tell or show the Brethren what good things God has done for him. (St. John 14:23), "If a man love me he will keep my words; and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him and make our abode with him." Oh, how wonderful to dwell with God and Jesus Christ! A man that has met God in a pardon and remission of his sins has received salvation here on earth and has a sure promise of a Home in Heaven when this life is past. (Rev. 22:14), "Blessed are they that do his commandments that they may have right to the tree of life and may enter through the gates into the City." This is the holy city, new Jerusalem. The city that is large enough to hold the entire human race (if they would repent) yet small enough to hold the redeemed of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

How many men have a right for the tree of life? (Isaiah 45:22), "Look unto me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth: for I am God, and there is none else." (Titus 2:11), "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men." No man can truthfully say that God has not appeared to him. There is a low still voice that talks to man, the

angel flying in the midst of heaven having the everlasting gospel to preach to all men everywhere. There is the true Light that will lead man to Life. I firmly believe that man has the choice as to where his eternal home will be. If he is obedient unto sin and death, Hell and the Lake will be his home. Man cannot work out his eternal salvation, but he can and must work himself completely out of works. (Ephesians 2:8), "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God."

Dear Brethren, the field is the world. The field is white, ready for harvest. Let us be about our Father's business. May we let our Love, the Love we were born of, flow from one to the other. This, I feel, would please God, would cause sinner men and women to fill the church houses to overflowing, and would cause you and I to prosper.

I feel that when Jesus Christ comes again on the Clouds of Glory that I will meet with all the blood-washed band of King Immanuel, My prayer is this: May God Bless and keep each of us.

### CONSTITUTION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

From a long series of experiences, we the OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

Article 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and upon their producing letters from their respective Churches certifying their approintment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

Article 2. In the letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

Article 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

Article 4. The Association, when convened, shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

Article 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

Article 6. New churches may be admitted into this Union, who shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received, and every church in the Union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

Article 7. Every query presented by the church to the Association, being first debated in their own churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

Article 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

Article 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the church with Minutes of the Association.

Article 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums as they think proper, and send it by their delegates to the Association, and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association, who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

Article 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association, shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation for his services.

Article 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

Article 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the Union, if deemed necessary.

Article 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present.

Article 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the churches; to give churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any member, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any church in the Union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the church2s.

# ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

Article 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence, and glory.

Article 2. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testaments are the written words of God and the only rules or faith and practices.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace, for by grace are are ye saved through faith.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore the Saviour is needed for our redemption.

Article 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance and believe in the Gospel and regeneration of the soul and sealed with Holy Spirit of promise, and none hall fall away and be lost.

Article 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of JESUS CHRIST.

Article 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on earth and the mode of IMMERSION back foremost so as to cover all over,

Article 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Saviour and that by the use of bread and the fruit of the vine, and feet washing should be kept up until his second coming by His believers.

Article 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

Article 10. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel except such as regularly ordained and baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the Gospel comes under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the church.

Article 11. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities.

Article 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation, is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

Article 13. We believe that the Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and one another, and have given themselves to the Lord and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the Gospel.

Article 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church and the government thereof is upon His shoulders.

Article 15. None of the above articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice and free consent.

### RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer,

Article 2. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

Article 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

Article 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

Article 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken, so as to make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.

Article 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

Article 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association and only five minutes at a time.

Article 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

Article 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other

Article 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of the decorum.

Article 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.

Article 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled; and he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

Article 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.
