PROCEEDINGS of the EIGHTY-NINETH ANNUAL SESSION of the SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

FRIDAY September 11, 1981

The Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist, the Church of Jesus Christ, assembled with the Pilgrim's Home Church, Varney, Pike County, Kentucky on Friday before the second Saturday in September, 1981.

Many of the old and beautiful songs of Zion were "lined" by the Brethren and sung by the congregation in that old fashion way so peculiar to Old Regular Baptist. The sweet melody of hundreds of voices in song, without the sound of a single musical instrument, washed over the soul and aroused the spirit to join in and sing praises to our mighty King!

Elder Edwin May, the humble and resplendent Moderator of Sardis Association, brought this spirit with him to the Stand as he attempted to put into words the "feeling" of gladness in seeing the Brethren come together again both spiritually and naturally, and the "feeling" of thankfulness that, through the mercy and goodness of God, he had been given strength to be here today. But words of mortal man cannot begin to express nor describe the "feeling" of the Spirit which Brother Ed tried to tell us about in his admonishment to "let brotherly love continue."

Elder Isom Hannah opened the Services about the hour of 9:30 a.m. preaching from his TEXT: "Through the tender mercy of our God; whereby the dayspring from on high hath visited us, to give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace." (Luke 1:78-79). With a multitude of Scriptures, Brother Isom expertly traveled in both the "old" and the "new" Covenant to show the importance of love toward one another wherein our swords are beaten into plowshares and we don't learn war any longer to fight and devour one another. That "Light" is none other than Jesus Christ, our Lord, and through Him the remission of sins is available to all men. Brother Isom then led in prayer.

According to the arrangements made by the Brethren last year, Elder Wallace Muncy came to the Stand to preach the Introductory Sermon from his TEXT: "Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints, and of the household of God; and are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief

corner stone; In whom all the building fitly framed together groweth unto an holy temple in the Lord: In whom ye also are builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit." (Ephesians 3:19-22).

Brother Wallace, like Solomon, desiring the wisdom of God more than all the riches of the world, very aptly linked the scriptures to show that with God there is "order" in all things, naturally and spiritually. After he diligently described the "order" of the first tabernacle, Brother Wallace showed that every man, and woman too, coming to Christ will fit into his proper place in the building built without hands, with Christ as its chief corner stone, and that all will be connected one to he other in faith in the house of the Lord. Just like the bones in a dry valley in Ezekiel's day, or like the two sticks, one had written "For Judah" and on the other "For Joseph, the stick of Ephraim" and when joined together became one in his hand, when we are born again we will be fitly framed and set in "order" in the building by the Lord.

As the twelve loaves of bread were placed in the first tabernacle and it was never without bread, Christ is set in the building as the bread of life where there is bread enough and plenty in our Father's house. From the building of the first Tabernacle the House of the Lord has not been without bread nor His children gone begging in the market place.

Brother Wallace advised the Brethren to look for the old, ancient land marks and, when we have found them, to ask God for wisdom, as Solomon did, in determining what they mean and then to follow them.

The Sardis Association delegates, and a large delegation from our corresponding Sister Associations, then assembled at the House where arrangements had been made for the work of the Sardis Association. As is our custom, the many non-delegate Brethren and the Sisters and friends remained at the tent to enjoy further that "feeling" which started even before we came up Brushy Creek this morning through the preaching of the Brethren.

Elder Grover Adkins, Moderator of the New Salem Association introduced the Service at the House and led in prayer.

We then proceeded as follows:

Brother Ed declared the need we have for each other and the strength of one for the other. He was very thankful to God for the strength God had given him over the past 30-years to travel to the several Churches and Associations and prayed the "feeling" of brotherly love would continue to abide with us throughout this Association.

Brethren;

In answer to the Query from the Dix Fork Church asking "Does the Sardis Association believe in Sisters wearing pants, slacks or shorts?" We, as an Advisory Council and not as a law making body say:

To answer this Query in the affirmative would be interpreted by some Brethren too liberally and they would say we have laid down the gate and opened the doors to anything and everything

To answer this Query in the negative would be interpreted by some Brethren too strictly and they would say we have shut the door on everything and Committees would flow from Church to Church like water.

We believe the Sardis Association should advise the Churches to advise their members - both Brethren and Sisters — to dress soberly and modestly and to conduct themselves in a manner that becometh a Child of God. We believe that each Child of God will adorn themselves in such a manner that they can easily be identified from the World. We feel the Bible, the infallable Word of God, sets forth and the Spirit will teach us how we should dress and conduct ourselves.

We believe, and the Association has so stated in the past, that each Church in the Sardis Association holds the key to its own door and is the sole judge of the conduct of its members so long as they follow the orthodox principles of religion and keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel as laid down in the Scriptures. In fact, Article 3 of our Constitution guarantees that the Association shall not infringe on the internal right of the Churches.

(18) The Association, by regular move and second, said that if a Sister has cut her hair, she should be asked to let it grow out; if she fails to do so and cuts her hair again, she will be excluded.

(19) By motion and second, it is ordered that we advise our Ministers of our Association not to marry people in adultry, where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.

(20) A Request from the Rebecca Church asks, "In the receiving of members having more than one living companion, does the criteria of receiving the innocent party also apply to the receiving of members by other than baptism (restoration, recommendation, letter)?

On regular move and second, the word "receive" in the following Item 21 is defined to include "any means of receiving members".

- (21) In answer to the question, "Shall we receive into fellowship men or women having more than one wife or husband?" The Association by regular move and second said, "We advise the Churches not to receive into their fellowship any such, except those who have put away their companion for the cause of fornication, such cases to have Gospel or Church evidence of same."
- (22) By motion and second, it is ordered that request for Union, Communion and Memorial Meetings be published in our Minutes.
- (23) By motion and second, it is ordered that Obituaries of our deceased Brothers and Sisters that are in good standing with the Church at the time of death be printed in our Minutes. These are to be presented to the Clerk at the end of the Association. A charge of \$10.00 will be made for a picture printed with the obituary, except that pictures of an Elder or his wife will continue to be printed free.
- (24) By move and second, it is requested that all of our Chruches who can do so should send help to the Rebecca Church who will host our 1982 Association. All donations should be sent not later than May 1982.
- (25) Ordered that we omit this year only the report of the Brethren called in Association, Union and Communion Meetings.
- (26) Ordered that we grant the Request of the Rebecca Church to host the 1982 session of the Sardis Association. The Rebecca Church is located at Myrtle, West Virginia. Take U.S. Route 119 from Williamson, West Virginia toward Logan, West Virginia to the Miller Creek Bridge; then, take the four lane road to the Belo Bridge; then, go to the second exit on the left and turn left; then, go one-half (½) mile on old Route 65 to the church.
- (27) The Sardis Association by unanimous voice tenders a most sincere "thank you" to this wonderful community and the Pilgrim's Home Church for the unfeigned love and support we received during these entire three days. We are especially grateful and indebted to Mrs. Tanny Williamson who so graciously allowed us the unrestricted use of her property for the tent and parking. A special prayer is made that God will reward her ever so generous offering.

We are everly thankful to the many, many Brethren, Sisters and friends of the several other Churches who contributed their prayers, time, food and funds to make this Association a success. Just as the spiritural man was fed by the "feeling" of this Association, the fantastic cooking of our dear Sisters fed the natural man to overflowing.

CIRCULAR LETTER

(Clerk's Note: As ordered by the Association, the following obiturary and letter of Elder Hi Maynard, printed in our 1947 Minutes, replaces the usual Circular Letter.)

Elder Hi Maynard

Elder Hi Maynard born in Pike County, Ky., on April 19th, 1874. Came to West Virginia in 1891 and began teaching in the Public school at the age of 16, in Logan County, (now Mingo.)

Was married on September 27th, 1894 to Elizabeth Runyon, the youngest daughter of Squire A. L. Runyon, Sr. To this union there was born 11 children, all surviving except one, who passed on in infancy. The living children are: Mary Hall, J.A., A.J., Samuel, William C. and John H. Maynard, Brookie Hay, Nannie Butcher, Mae Adkins, and Mattie. Had 25 grand-children, one great-grandchild and a host of relatives and friends to mourn his loss.

He united with the Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ in 1894, was baptized by Elder A.L. (Zan) Dempsey, and was ordained to preach the Gospel on the First Sabbath in July, 1895.

He was very studious in his Bible study and spent many years to study to shew himself approved unto God a workman that needeth not be ashamed rightly dividing the Word of Truth.

He was firm in his convictions, brief in his speech, persuasive and convicing in his discourses, but would yield if wrong.

His field of labor for the years was spent in West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, Virginia and North Carolina.

He helped to organize several Churches and was instrumental in the hand of God to point many poor souls to the "Lamb of God."

The wife of his youth suddenly passed on April 3, 1920, and left him with a large family of motherless children. He was married the second time to Mrs. Nannie Webb on January 3rd, 1921. She only lived until July 3rd, 1925, and his third marriage was to Mrs. Brookie Salmons on August 27th, 1926.

His last days were devoted almost entirely to his calling - Preaching the Gospel of the Saviour of all men and Special Saviour of those who believe.

He, in his last days, would go far and near to answer calls to preach, though burdened with disease and pain. He did not complain much. He enjoyed the Brotherhood of the Church, and believed it was the only institution for a child of God. He believed in the infallibility of the word of God and emphasized the Doctrine of the resurrection of the dead, also was a strong advocate of eternal Happiness of the Children of God, and everlasting punishment of the wicked and un-Godly.

He advocated the doctrine of Salvation by grace through faith in Christ Jesus; that faith justified, but grace saved.

He fully believed in the example of Jesus Christ-Feet washing, that it should be observed by his children, for in doing these things we are happy.

He was a firm believer in the Doctrine of a "visible" Kingdom or Church, and that it was organized and given its laws by its law giver Jesus Christ.

He believed in the final perserverance and the eternal victory of the Church, and in the resurrection the last enemy which is Death would be destroyed.

He refused to acknowledge any human head for the Church, believing that Christ was, is, and shall forever remain the Priest, Prophet, King and Head of the Church and through Him and by Him, and Him alone we have an access to God.

He ignored artificial and human plans for the Salvation of sinners, thereby contended that a man called of God could and would preach the Word and the Word was quick and powerful, and sinners were convinced of sin by the Holy Spirit.

He believed in the continuance of brotherly love in the Church and that if one member suffer all the members suffer, for we are members of the same body - the Body of Jesus Christ.

He delighted in the tranquility and peacefulness of the Church and was greatly disturbed when trouble arose among the children of God.

He believed that though miracles had passed yet the gift of healing by the prayer of faith was effectual as described by the Apostle James.

That the children of God should not forsake the assembling of themselves together for the purpose of worship, prayer and in love for the perpetuation of the lovely union and fellowship of the Church.

That we should constantly and earnestly contend for the faith once delivered unto the Saints, loving with pure hearts fervently both our Brethren and the Lord Jesus Christ, our Elder Brother, who was delivered for our transgressions and rose again for our justification.

Be thou faithful unto death.

To my many precious and beloved Brethren who live among the hills and mountains of West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky and other states: Beloved:

As my labors in the cause of my Master are now finished and I must lay my armour down, I can, and do rejoice in my Saviour's love that my preaching was not with deceit nor with envy and strife but have endeavored to speak to you prayerfully and under the influence of His precious Spirit and grace.

I now feel that my work is done here on earth; and I pray to God that after my passing you will strive for things that will cause peace, love and fellowship my passing your midst. Let brother love continue. Live in peace among to reign in your midst. Let brother love continue. Live in peace among yourselves. Pray for one another, be sober, be humble, be obedient to our great leader - Jesus Christ in all things. God will keep his own even in the hours of trial and persecution.

My voice will soon be stilled by death, but I thank His holy name, I shall soon be blessed to see Him in whom I trust and in whom I believe and who soon be blessed to see Him in whom I trust and in whom I believe and who soon be blessed to see Him in whom I trust and in whom I believe and who saved my poor soul and who shall, on that sweet day redeem my body by His great power to raise in the great and glorious Victory over death and the grave. Brethren farewell - avoid back-biting, tattling and evil speaking. Speak the things that become sound doctrine, and let love reign with forgiving hearts and God will bless you in your gatherings in His Holy name. The time is short, be prayerful and sincere.

May His grace be with you through Jesus' name. Amen.







ASSOCIATION

From a long series of experiences we, the OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the Letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the Church with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any member, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost; and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

ARTICLE 2. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testaments of the Authorized King James Version of the Bible are the written words of God and are the only rules of faith and practice.

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace, for by grace are ye saved through faith.

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore the Saviour is needed for our redemption.

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance and believe in the Gospel and regeneration of the soul and sealed with Holy Spirit of promise, and none shall fall away and be lost.

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's Church on earth and the mode of IMMERSION, back foremost, so as to cover all over.

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command

of the Saviour, and that by the use of bread and the fruit of the vine; and feet washing should be kept up until His second coming by His believers.

ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

ARTCILE 10. We believe that no Minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the Gospel except such as regularly ordained and baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the Gospel comes under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the Church.

under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the Church.

ARTICLE 11. We believe it to be the duty of all Church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the Church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities.

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

ARTICLE 13. We believe that the Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and one another, and have given themselves to the Lord and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel.

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church and the government thereof is upon His shoulders.

ARTICLE 15. None of the above Articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reporbation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these Articles be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association; and only five minutes at a time.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother".

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the Rules of Decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the Decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.
