

September 10, 2021

The Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist, the Church of Jesus Christ, assembled in the Business Room of the Sardis Association Building at 180 Brushy School Road, Varney, Pike County, Kentucky, with our host, the Big Branch Church and co-host Churches; Apple Orchard, Bent Branch, Pilgrims Home and Turkey Creek, on Friday before the second Saturday in September 2021.

About the hour of 9:00 a.m., our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the stand to a sparsely moderate congregation and welcomed everyone, including the Brothers, Sisters, Friends and all in attendance. Brother Tommy spoke, saying in times of trouble God always comes through for those who serve and strive for him. There is some stirring to be done, but we can only do that through Jesus Christ. The key to all is love, as it is all hung upon love. For the Bible says that *God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever would believe upon him, shall have everlasting life.* So we have got to believe from the heart. We must give everything else up and believe. We have to put our faith in Jesus Christ, who is the mediator between us and Heaven today. It's through the spirit that we can serve God. We can't serve him through the flesh. All come and let love flow from breast to breast. Let's be humble and know the good Lord is watching all we do. We need the spirit of God to direct us today.

Elder Ivan Neil Thornsbury, having been chosen as alternate for this session's Introductory Sermon, came to the stand saying I come with great fear and a lot of love in my heart for all of you. I love this old church, this association and this family. It is my hope that we can work together in love today. If you go with the love of Jesus Christ in your heart, it is a marvelous thing. Before I came into the church, I had worldly love. When I came to Jesus Christ, I now have a new love. We can't have peace without the love of God. If you have love, you have peace. I have got it on my mind to preach about that peace today. Jesus Christ came down to establish a grace covenant. By the deeds of the law, no flesh shall be saved. We have got to keep the Ten Commandments and we must keep them wherever we go. Jesus said if you love me you will keep my commandments.

God sent his only begotten son into this old world, to die for the sins of the world. Those out in the world love darkness rather than light. I also loved darkness when I was out there in the world. Jesus said in Matthew 11:28, *Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give*

you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light. In 1998 I had a heavy burden. I started to cast those burdens off me, but I was trying to clean them up all on my own. I was like those down in Egypt's land, at first they had the very best. I also had the very best until I stepped out into sin. God heard my cries and put me on a rock. I am no longer my own keeper. God used Moses to lead his people out of Egypt. For forty years Moses was raised up and given wisdom. God was going to use him to lead his people out of Egypt. Moses saw the burning bush and the angel spoke to him, saying pull off your sandals, for you stand on holy ground. Tell them that the "I Am" sent you. Moses had an experience, as I also had an experience. You must experience it for yourself. Nothing can now separate me from the love of Christ. Christ comes in your life and takes up his abode, never to go out. In order to get your name entered into the Lambs Book of Life, you must have the blood of Jesus applied. Moses delivered them out, and before that they had to have the blood applied to the door post. You better get that blood applied to you. God let Moses see the promise land, and when you leave this world, you will get to see that good land as well.

God will hear your prayers, he won't turn away a beggar. I was trying to clean myself up, but I kept coming up short. If you want to go to Heaven you have to fear God and make a change. You have got to fear where you are going. I want to spend eternity in Heaven. Just look around at the world today, we are living in the days of Noah. All around us they are calling evil good and good evil. Bless them that curse you, pray for them that spitefully use you, so that you can be a child of God. The sun sets on the just and the unjust. I got down serious and began to seek that old path, and I walked therein. The Holy Spirit will guide your ways.

Elder Steve Baker, of the Old Friendship Association, then led in prayer.

Elder Andrew Walters, having been chosen last year, came to preach the Introductory Sermon. Brother Andy began by saying it is with a great fear that I come before you today. I am thankful the Lord has blessed us to meet out one more time. He blesses us in ways we don't even know about. I hope that you will pray for a few moments and he will reach down.

Brother Andy sang, "Precious Lord Take My Hand." It came to my mind this morning that in 1976 at the age of six years old, I walked through those doors out there to join my classmates to go to school. This morning I walked in here to join my family, God's family. I am glad that he made me a part of this family. We are all striving for the same place. I am glad this morning that he had mercy on me. He has got love in one hand and mercy in the other. He is willing to give it to anyone that will call upon him.

Sometimes I go back to that spot that love came to me in the bathroom floor of an old trailer. I am thankful that the Lord has blessed me and how good he is today. We are here for a little while, as life is like a vapor that appears on the water and vanishes away. We don't know what is in store for us. I love the Lord, why because he first loved me. When I first came into this building as a little boy, God knew I would be standing here today. I was changed to a new creature and it is better felt than told. I am glad the Lord had mercy on me and I am glad his arms are stretched out. If you need rest today, his name is Jesus. I heard about Jesus all my life, but I didn't truly know him. I truly met him one day a few years ago. This is not the end of it. When they put us in that grave, it may seem like the end but it's really just the beginning. At the lowest point in my life, my friends did all they could do for me. I met Jesus Christ. I've done a lot in life but I've never experienced anything like the love of God. Get a hold of him and hold on tight.

This place is not the end of it. There is a better place waiting, a land where there is no virus to fear.

I can feel the spirit of the Lord all over me today. He is right here amongst us today. I have never felt anything like the Lord. He can take you upon the mountain. He loved me when I was not fit to be loved. As a boy I knew my mom and dad loved me. My dad would have laid his very life down for me. Every day that God gives you is a blessing. There is a place where we will not have to die no more. I had a fear coming into church as a young man. God did not say no to me, and I will not say no when he calls me to do something. God is real today, he is not a fairy tale. I can feel him all over me this morning. He saved me, but there are more out there in the world that need saved too. I am going to try to warn them. The devil has gone wild in the world today. I know one that when he speaks, the devil has to get out of the way. I have tried to raise my daughter and grandchildren right. The Bible says to raise them in the way they should go and they shall not depart. That is what I am trying to do. I will be able to see Jesus one day. If you don't know him, you need to steal away somewhere and pray. Get your heart in the right spot and he will be right there. I am here today because God put me here. In my travel I was in a bad way, going from church to church. God led me home to the Old Regular Baptist. I am right where I want to be, he gave me a home. God knows all about you and Jesus loves you. I am glad he came into my life and gave me a home in Heaven.

The Sardis Association delegates and a moderate delegation from our Corresponding Sister Associations remained in the Business Room for the Work of this Association, and as is our custom, the many non-delegate Brethren, Sisters and friends were dismissed to assemble in the Preaching Room to hear the preaching of:

The delegates having assembled themselves in order, Elder Thomas J. Dials, our Moderator, called to seats the delegates from our Churches sent to represent them in this Association and the delegates sent by our Corresponding Sister Associations. Brother Tommy called upon Elder A.B. Thacker of the Union Association to open the service.

Brother A.B. said, I am the least one of you today. I sure am glad God gave me mercy. The world doesn't have any mercy. In him we find our peace. The only peace I can find is in the old church. I see so many faces missing this morning, but I wouldn't want to call them back. Blessed is he who dies in the Lord. God is our hope and when he appears, we shall also appear with him in Glory. We have a strong hope. There is no peace in the world. Jesus said I leave my peace with you. Jesus is the way and I got in that way. He said go home and show and tell your friends what great things the Lord has done for you. I believe that is talking about going to the church. The brother said inquire to the old path, we are a branch off that old path. He is going to gather his children from the north, south, east and west. I believe with all my heart we are at the end of time. There are not many people praying, and with no prayers, God will quit saving. We need not wait, for but in a few more days, God will call us home. In the world there is trouble, but I have found peace in the Lord. I love my family and I love for them to come to the house. My

wife will fix a big meal and we'll all sit around and eat together. One of these days were going to be called home to a supper table. I'm looking forward to that new home. God has the strength, let's walk and speak in that peace. Let's show the world we are different. I walk a different walk, I talk a different talk than before. I am waiting on Jesus to call and say come on home.

Elder Chuck Hall, of the New Salem Association, then led in prayer.

The Sardis Association then proceeded as follows:

(5) The Committee on Finance reported \$4,295.00 received from the Churches and after turning this amount over to the Treasurer was discharged by regular move and second.

(6) The Moderator appointed a Committee to arrange the preaching for Friday Night and Saturday, consisting of one delegate from each Church in the Sardis Association, and the entire delegation from the host church.

(7) The Moderator appointed the following Committee of Tellers to take the vote of the Sardis Association delegates for Officers to serve the Sardis Association for the coming year and instructed the delegates to vote for a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk:

(8) The Sardis Association then completed its 2021 organization by selecting the following Officers to serve for the coming year, and by regular move and second, the report of the Committee of Tellers was accepted, and the Committee was discharged:

(9) The Moderator asked the Association what they wanted to do about appointing a second Assistant Clerk to help with the clerk's duties. By regular move and second, Elder Todd Dials was appointed to serve as an Assistant Clerk for the year 2021.

(12) By regular move and second, the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum, and the Constitution were read.

(13) The Moderator called for the Letters from our Corresponding Sister Associations. The following Letters and attached correspondence were read and, by regular move and second, were received, the delegates were seated with us in Council and given the right hand of fellowship by our Moderator:

(15) The Moderator called for newly organized Churches or other Churches of our same faith and order desiring to take up correspondence with the Sardis Association, and for Associations desiring to take up correspondence with the Sardis Association. The Rebecca Old Regular Baptist Church responded requesting to reinstate correspondence.

(16) The Moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements consisting of one delegate from each Church and all the Officers of the Sardis Association, along with the entire delegation from each of our Corresponding Sister Associations, to arrange the business for Saturday's session of the Sardis Association. By regular move and second, the committee will meet at 1:30 p.m. today.

(17) On motion from Elder Randy Lackey, seconded by Brother Bobby Scott Jr., the Sardis Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, September 11, 2021.

SATURDAY

September 11, 2021

Met pursuant to adjournment at the Sardis Association Building where, about the hour of 9:00 a.m., our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the stand to welcome all, stating it is wonderful to be loved by God, realizing he died for us. It is wonderful to be in a loving family. Natural love can be bought, but that love sent by God through his only begotten son is wonderful. That spiritual love is on the inside, but it can come to the outside. Soldiers at your post doing what God wants you to do. Never a better time to find Jesus. When Jesus gets off his throne, mercy is ceased. How important it is to get Jesus while you have life and opportunity. One day we are going to get up and answer that call. We have to realize the importance of serving him. We got to please God and do what he tells us to do. We have got to subdue the natural man, who gets unruly, but I got a man on the inside that is stronger. It's good to be here and feel your love.

He then called upon Elder Jeff Lewis, of the Old Indian Bottom Association, to open these services. Brother Jeff said, there is coming a day that if you are not ready you will not be going with the Church. If you don't have the Father, Son and Holy Ghost you will not go back. I'm an empty vessel today, I came up under some good brothers and sisters that held up the blood stained banner before me when I was just a lost boy sitting in the back of the back of the house. Men and women have got a window of opportunity, a space of time to work in. People have stopped following the word of God. There are dead men walking among us today. They have turned him away, turned their backs on God. Things are going to get worse. Men and women need to work while there is day. Get God down in your life. As men and women get older their hearts get harder. I'm thankful that I came into the Church as a young man. Today is the day of salvation, harden not your heart. May God's will be done today. I hope that the delegates will work together as one today. I've never figured out this preaching it has to come down from God out of Heaven. Make yourself fit out in the field. I'm thankful to be among the children of God today. Men and women I want you to go to Heaven, where that call comes from. It won't be the church's fault, it will be the individual's fault, and you won't have an excuse. Every act of obedience that is done before God is rewarded. I found obedience out in the field.

Elder John Lewis, of the Philadelphia Association, then led in prayer.

The Sardis Association then proceeded as follows:

STANDING ITEMS

Item 1. Item 14 of our 1975 Minutes is reprinted, without the preamble, as follows:

Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist

September 13, 1975
Dingess, West Virginia

Brethren:

In answer to the Query from the Dix Fork Church asking, "Does the Sardis Association believe in Sisters wearing pants, slacks or shorts?" We, as an Advisory body, say:

To answer this query in the affirmative would be interpreted by some Brethren too liberally and they would say we have laid down the gate and opened the doors to anything and everything.

To answer this Query in the negative would be interpreted by some Brethren too strictly and they would say we have shut the door on everything and Committees would flow from Church to Church like water. We believe the Sardis Association should advise the Churches to advise their members, both Brethren and Sisters, to dress soberly and modestly and to conduct themselves in a manner that becometh a Child of God. We believe that each Child of God will adorn themselves in a manner that they can easily be identified from the world. We feel the Bible, the infallible Word of God, sets forth and the Spirit will teach us how we should dress and conduct ourselves.

We believe, and the Association has so stated in the past, that each Church in the Sardis Association holds the key to its own door and is the sole judge of the conduct of its members as long as they follow the orthodox principles of religion and keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel as laid down in the Scriptures. In fact, Article 3 of our Constitution guarantees that the Association shall not infringe on any internal right of the Churches.

Item 2. The Association, by regular move and second, said that if a Sister has cut her hair, she should be asked to let it grow out; if she fails to do so and cuts her hair again, she will be excluded.

Item 3. It is ordered that we advise our Ministers of our Churches not to marry anyone having a living husband or wife unless they bring scripture evidence for putting their husband or wife away. (1929 minute)

Item 4. It is ordered that we advise our Churches not to allow their Ministers to preach with any Minister who has two living women. (1919 minute)

Item 5. It is ordered that requests for Union, Communion and Memorial meetings be published in our Minutes.

Item 6. By motion and second, it is ordered that Obituaries of our deceased Brethren and Sisters that are in good standing with the Churches at the time of death be printed in our Minutes. Also, friends of the Churches that are recommended by the Churches be printed in a separate section of our minute. These are to be presented to the Clerk at the end of the Association. A charge of \$15.00 will be made for a picture with the obituary, except that pictures of an Elder or his wife will continue to be printed free.

Clerks Notes on Item 6:

- ❖ Please note the above order - it is incumbent upon the churches in the Sardis Association that they be the screen and recommending body of Obituaries of Friends to be printed in our minutes and identify the same (by note or otherwise) to the Clerks when the Obituary is turned in. Each Church Moderator is further required to screen and approve any Obituary of a Friend of the Church and to reject any Obituary that has language that is offensive to the Sardis Association.

- ❖ To expedite the processing of the Minutes, obituaries should be typed, please be sure the name of the deceased is written on the back of the picture and indicate if you want the picture returned by mail. You may also email your typed obituaries and pictures to Elder Michael Lowe throughout the year at the following email address: MDL448@HOTMAIL.COM, You would still need to send the \$15 payment for printing pictures.

Item 7. “We the Sardis Association, advise our Sister Churches that it is not our practice to use sisters or double-married men in any function of the ministry, including leading prayer, in any of our Church services.”

Item 8. By regular move and second, it is ordered that Item (15) of our 1999 Minute be reprinted as follows: “It is a sin for anyone to put away their wife or husband for any cause except for fornication and marry another. In regards to going behind one’s experience or receiving one in the Church with more than one living companion, we say that each Church shall be the sole judge to the validity of one’s experience. Churches should not be forced to receive members, however, that would destroy the body. (Receive should be interpreted to include all means of receiving members.)”

We ask you give an experience, what experience do we want to hear, I've been praying on account of my sins. We want to hear of an experience of grace. They will have something to say. *From the heart man believeth unto righteousness, with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.* If you confess to something that hasn't happened to you, you're in great trouble. Seek the Lord with your whole heart. Listen to him, he will give you something to say. When God blesses me to preach, I love you with all my heart. If I live a few more years, I want God to be in my life every day. The Lord will listen with his ear to your heart.

He called for a song, and we sang, "To See A Pilgrim As He Dies."

A heart felt prayer was led by Elder John Wayne White, of the Sardis Association.

Elder Nathan Little, of the New Salem Association, came to the stand saying, I am honored to be among this great host this morning. God loves his people and provides for them. Brother Nathan sung, "Letters From My Father."

I love you all with a heart full of love. I can do nothing without him. God has been so good to me. Seeing all these young people today makes me happy. God saved my soul at the age of seventeen, and it's been the best time of my life. I had trouble in life, but a staff to lean upon. I

thought about how many times the world has tried to stomp out the Church. We got something greater on the inside than what is in the world. Jesus Christ loves you today. They cast three little Hebrew boys in the fire but those boys trusted in God. I'm glad today that if you have God on your side you will be a winner either way. They thought they were going to get rid of those Hebrew boys. They turned the furnace up seven times hotter than ever before. It was so hot it burned up those that cast them into the fire. They thought they had finally gotten rid of them and stomped out their light. The old king got worried and went back to look into the furnace. He said did we not cast three into the fire, but I now see four, and one likened unto the son of man. He is in the fire for his people today. God will walk with you and talk with you. Repentance is required at the hands of all men. You need to have an experience of grace. Jesus can take you back to that spot. I felt Heaven come all over me. I was baptized with the fire and the Holy Ghost that day. Listen, you need him more than you need life, more than your next breath. They are trying to stomp us out, saying we are not doing any good. Jesus is for us, if he is for us, who can be against us. They stripped him and were horrible to him. Seek the Lord and work while it is day, for when night comes no man can work. In simple terms, work when the spirit is with you. God's people love one another, they will give you a hug around your neck. I'm thankful for the Sardis Association and the love that I feel. Work together in peace, love and joy.

Elder Clyde Lewis, of the Philadelphia Association came to the stand saying, I thank God he has blessed me with the health and strength to be here today. We realize our days are getting shorter, our steps are getting shorter. If the spirit of God is not in the preaching, it has no power, and if it has no power it has no effect. We can't preach the gospel in nature. Open your mouth and say the words. When man is in the spirit, he won't preach nothing wrong. There is only one way from here to there. The only way to get there is through and by Jesus Christ. There are many ways upon this earth, but he told us to stand in the way, and inquire into that old path. This path is marked by his blood and easy to follow. He was the high priest, the one that came from Heaven here, ordained by the almighty God. If God has not called and ordained you, it will do you no good. He was born of a virgin woman sent from Heaven. He came for a purpose. He came to fulfill something and establish one. This high priest was not well thought of. As long as he obeyed the law, everybody liked him. He was born of the law, and he kept the law. His name is Jesus, but he had a forerunner. God sent this man, born under the law, but born and filled with the Holy Ghost. He was guided by the Holy Ghost. It will lead you if you are born again. He was sent for a purpose. This man, John, on the banks of the Jordan came. In 1971, I had a new birth, I got a new name. On earth I was born a Lewis, but God heard my cry and I was given a new name. I'm now a Baptist. John was standing on the banks preaching something. Lift up his voice. What did they hear, they heard that sound from Heaven, the sound that woke up a dead man.

There was another man sent from Heaven, who had a mother, but no natural father. He was the son of God. John standing on the banks baptizing, looked across the river and saw him. I see him, he is the one you shall see when the Holy Ghost gets upon him. Up to that day, Jesus kept the law because he was the high priest. But he was made after the order of God. From that day forward he stopped keeping the law, because he was fulfilling the law. Grace came by Jesus

Christ, life came by him. Jesus began to go around preaching, forgiving them of their sins. He was God in the flesh. He came back for something, a wife. I found a little girl one time, about eighteen years old, we got married, and have been married fifty two years. I love her and don't want to go into the house of a strange woman. Why would I want to go into a strange house? I am satisfied with mine, I don't hunt for another one. This is all the plan of God. If you are seeking God, keep on seeking. Seek him with all your heart. I couldn't repent without God. When it was offered to me, I turned. God knew my heart. By his mighty hand he laid hold of mine and led me through the travel. This man Jesus came freely from Heaven. Why? So that you may have life and not die. When death overtakes me, I will sleep until my husband awakens me. This man Jesus is the most important person in your life today. Let me a beggar have Jesus in my heart. Jesus walked the shores down this way, he loved them all.

Jesus' own people turned on him. His own people and his own household. We was arrested. He was the high priest. He was the only one that could do something. The earth was searched and no one found worthy to take the book. An angel appeared and said weep not John, one has been found and he is worthy. He put my name with his engraving into the palm of his hand. Jesus loves you so much. They brought him before a man who thought he had all power. Satan rules the kingdom of the world. But when Jesus speaks Satan has to bow down to him. They brought him to Pilate, who said I have power to kill you or let you go. Jesus answered saying, thou has no power lest my Father give it to you, and he asked him are you the Christ. I can see Him now. When they hung him they beat him, he could feel all that was done to him. Another man was compelled to help him carry the cross. Jesus was not carrying the wood cross, but the cross of sins for the whole world. Jesus hung on the tree for you, for my children and for you. When they got him upon the hill, only the high priest could offer the sacrifice for sins. Jesus offered a sacrifice for all that sin and came short of the glory of God. I got a home awaiting for me. As he was hanging on that tree and looked out among the people. Who are my brothers and my sisters? Those that do the will of my father. He looked over the scattered people, not a bone of him was broken.

Be careful how you handle your brothers. You better be good to him. Lovest thou me? If you love him, you love the brotherhood. He broke down the middle wall, a partition and gave you and me the rights to enter into the Holiest of Holys. He done away with the law and fulfilled it. The Roman soldier pierced him in the side and forth came blood and water. It takes that blood to cleanse you and water to give you life. We have grace now in full effect. There was silence in Heaven for a space of a half hour, to pay homage to the King. The angels and the heavenly hosts were silent. One of these days, I expect to be in that land where everything will be alright. Love one another as he has loved you. Enter not into the house of a strange woman. I love God and I love his ways. If you will get in the way, the way will get in you, and you will be blessed.

Elder Northern Gayle Brown of the New Salem Association, came saying I love God's people and I love being around them. I desire God's riches, but right now I desire your prayers. This world keeps getting worse, and it's not going to get any better. The Bible says we are in the world, but not of the world. There is just the Church and the world. The world is going to hell, the Church is going up. The only way to get to it is through repentance. Repentance is a godly sorrow. You have got to go through and by Jesus Christ.

Once you get into the sheepfold, you don't want to go out. We are happy. People of the world look and say we are a poor people, but they don't know what riches are all about. It takes God to set that sorrow up. You can only work when the spirit is working with you. When Jesus came at the age of thirty, he went out and was seeking the work of his father. He called them and told them to follow him and they would be fishers of men. If people pay attention, they will be caught. He picked twelve, but he picked one that was of the Devil. He went preaching his own everlasting gospel. They have been trying to kill him ever since his birth. He was laid in a manger, a place no child was ever laid. A message went out and the Sheppard's were keeping the flock. That message went out and spoke to them about a child in Bethlehem. They began to follow that light, I followed that light that led to Jesus Christ. They brought him gifts, but the greatest gift was laying there. He preached his everlasting gospel for three and a half years. When the time came and they laid him in a tomb. Nichodemus was there and begged for the body of Jesus. They placed soldiers all around. All those soldiers couldn't do anything about it. The sisters came to anoint his body. Gold was right there with them in the tomb. He said you tear this temple down and in three days I will raise it up again. They thought he was talking about the building that took forty years to build, but he was talking about his body. They thought they were rid of him. I am glad he offered his life for me. In 1989, I offered my life for him. A child of God wants to hold as close as they can to Jesus Christ. On the third and appointed morning, Jesus came out of that grave. The grave clothes and napkin were folded up a certain way. What did that mean? It meant that the one that left is coming back. The Devil is a liar and the father of it. Satan was cast down out of Heaven, out of the old church. We got a stranger thing now. He can't get in God's church today. We are hedged in, we are on our way to Heaven. We are singing a pretty song. What is the title? It is Jesus. When he tunes us up, we are tuned up. I don't have to get up here to get tuned up. I advise everybody to come to this man Jesus. That man on the inside is alive and alive forever more. Nothing can separate us from the love of God. There is nothing like this man Jesus Christ. On this earth, there is nothing like Jesus' church. She is all dressed up and ready to go. Got a robe on. When Jesus comes back in his cloud of glory, we are going to follow the lamb and rejoice. God's children all over this world are married to the same man.

Elder Thomas J. Dials, our Moderator, came saying they have told you about Jesus and told you about his birth. We got to be careful, we have to be of the one family and the one blood. We must be born again, by the word of God that liveth and abidith forever. There was this man that his family was mad at him because God gave him a dream. They are after God's people, the church, they will kill you. Paul went through a lot, normal people went through it because of serving Jesus Christ. We are looking to one source, looking to him. Joseph was sold down there

for thirty pieces of silver. God was watching over him and God is watching over us today. I've got a good King. As long as we serve him he will take care of us. We got two choices to serve God or serve the Devil. If you serve the Devil you're going down to hell. Death and hell will be cast into the lake of fire. Jesus had no room in the inn. Have you got a place for him? When we get rid of this old man, Jesus will come in and take up his abode and make you new again. He will come to stay. Israel committed spiritual fornication. When you get that Holy Ghost baptism, he is on the inside and will guide you. He will guide you to a door, that door is Jesus Christ. In my father's house are many mansions, if it were

not so I would have told you. I go away to prepare a place for you and I will come again. He said I am coming back and will receive you unto myself. I'll get to sing that new song. I'd rather have it than all the silver and gold in this world. If God be for us, who can be against us. There is but one way to Heaven and his name is Jesus Christ. They came to kill, steal and destroy, but I came to give you life and that you may have it more abundantly. He will be with you all the way to the end of the world. He died and was buried and on the third day got up. Thirty-nine years ago God breathed life down in my soul. He told John on the Isle of Patmos *I am he that liveth, and was dead, and behold I am alive for evermore. I am the bread that came down out of Heaven that you may eat thereof and never die.* He gave me eternal life and now I am awaiting on my change. He will come close enough to have every eye see him, and every knee will bow.

Behold, how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. That's when you can feel that love flowing from breast to breast. There's nothing better than one mind and one accord when we come together, and work together in peace and love.

My hope is that I can pile up a few stones along my way so all that come after us, even my children and yours alike would know the way we have gone. *But the day of the LORD will come as a thief in the night; in which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, and the earth also and the works therein shall be burned up.* (2 Peter 3:10) So we need to keep warning men and women by the word of God to seek that eternal home. *Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter; Fear God and keep his commandments, is the whole duty of man.* (Ecclesiastes 12:13)





So, we will close this with words from a poem written by Granddaughter Tiffany Triplett.


*Your body has grown weary, and you've fought your last fight






LONNIE JAMES TAYLOR



ROGER "ROD" BLACKBURN







CONSTITUTION OF THE SARDIS SSOCIATION

From a long series of experiences, we, the OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the Letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the Union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted to this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the Churches with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association Fund for defraying the expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk before the Association rises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by the will of the majority of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power to provide for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any member, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have the power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God; the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost; and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

ARTICLE 2. We believe the scripture of the Old and New Testaments of the Authorized King James Version of the Bible are the written words of God and are the only rules of faith and practice.

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace, for by grace are ye saved through faith.

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore the Savior is needed for our redemption.

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance and believe in the Gospel and regeneration of the soul and sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none shall fall away and be lost.

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's Church on earth and the mode IMMERSION, back foremost, so as to cover all over.

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Savior, and that by use of bread and the fruit of the vine, and feet washing should be kept up until his second coming by his believers.

ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

ARTICLE 10. We believe that no Minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the Gospel except such as are regularly baptized by immersion of a legal administrator of the Gospel and ordained coming under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the Church.

ARTICLE 11. We believe it to be the duty of all Church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the Church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities.

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation is erroneous, and such doctrine shall be rejected by us.

ARTICLE 13. We believe that the Church of Jesus Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and one another and have given themselves to the Lord and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel.

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the Church and the government thereof is upon His Shoulders.

ARTICLE 15. We believe that a sanctioned marriage of God is between a man and a woman only. Also, we believe in receiving members into our fellowship that follow the natural dating relationship that leads to holy matrimony between a man and a woman only: thereby, preserving the family unit of father, mother and children. Ephesians 5:22,23 and 28, St. Mark 10:6,7,8 and Romans 1:26 and 27.

ARTICLE 16. None of the above Articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men, nor shall any of those Articles be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association, and only five minutes at a time.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term or appellation than that of "brother."

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the Rules of Decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the Decorum shall be reprovved by the Association as they think proper.
